

# Thefts, Burglaries and Frauds account for 85% of recorded Headline Crime

In the first quarter of 2007, offences categorised as *Theft, Burglary* or *Fraud* accounted for 85% of all headline crime recorded by the Gardaí. There were 21,803 such incidents recorded, compared to 23,168 in the same period of 2006 (a decrease of 5.9%).

In that period, there were reductions in recorded offences classified as Homicide, Sexual Offences, Thefts and Burglary. These categories also showed reductions in the 12-month period ending in the first quarter, 2007. The largest percentage fall was in incidents classified as Sexual Offences. See Table 2.

The numbers of incidents classified as *Assaults, Arsons, Drugs offences, Robberies* and *Frauds* increased in the 12-month period ending in the first quarter of 2007. The largest percentage increases were in *Drugs* offences (+22.2%) and *Frauds* (+22.5%).

The following are some of the changes in the numbers of crime incidents recorded in the first quarter and in the 12-month period ending in the first quarter, 2007.

#### **Group 01 - Homicides**

The number of offences classified as *Murder* or *Manslaughter* fell to 62 in the 12 months ending in the first quarter of 2007, when compared with a total of 67 in the previous 12-month period. This represents a drop of 7.5%. In the first quarter of 2007 there were 10 such incidents recorded, compared with 14 in the first quarter of 2006.

#### Group 02 - Assaults

There was a 10.2% reduction in the number of *Assault causing harm* offences recorded in the first quarter of 2007 when compared with the same period of 2006. However, in the 12-month period ending in the first quarter, the number of such incidents recorded rose by 247, an increase of 6.7% from the previous 12-month period.

#### **Group 03 - Sexual Offences**

Most offences in this category showed large reductions in both the first quarter and 12-month periods. Overall, the number of offences in this category dropped by 44.5% and 16.6% in the quarter and 12-month period, respectively.

#### Group 04 - Arson

There were 432 recorded incidents of Arson in the first quarter of 2007, an increase of 22.4% over the corresponding period of 2006. In the 12 months ending in the first quarter, the total was 1,735, an increase of 19.4%.

#### Group 05 - Drugs

All offences in this category showed increases in the first quarter of 2007 and in the 12-month period. Overall, recorded drug offences were up by 699 (22.2%) in the 12-month period. Offences of *Possession of drugs for sale or supply* increased by 545 (20.6%) in the 12-month period.

#### Group 06 - Thefts

Offences in this category made up 56% of all headline offences in the 12-month period ending in the first quarter of 2007. Overall, recorded thefts were down by 5.1% and 1.5% in the quarter and 12-month period respectively. Over the 12 months, *Theft from person* fell by 879 incidents (19.8%) while *Theft from MPV* was down by 520 (3.8%). In the same period, recorded *Theft from shop* incidents rose by 1,225 (7.2%).

#### Group 07 - Burglaries

Recorded offences included in this category fell by 3,406 (12.6%) in the 12-month period ending in the first quarter, 2007. In that period, burglary offences accounted for 23% of all recorded headline crime.

#### Group 08 - Robberies

In the 12-month period ending in the first quarter of 2007, there were decreases of 10.9% and 23.1% in the number offences recorded under the headings of Robbery of an establishment/institution and Robbery of cash/goods in transit, respectively. Robberies from the person, however, showed an increase of 15.5% in that period.

#### Group 09 - Frauds

There were 5,124 recorded incidents in this category in the 12-month period ending in the first quarter of 2007. This represents an increase of 22.5% on the previous 12-month period.


#### **Group 10 - Other Headline Offences**

There were 15 less (14.6%) recorded incident of *Possession of firearms* in the first quarter of 2007 than in the corresponding period of 2006. Over the same periods, however, incidents of *Discharging a firearm* rose by 25 (41.7%). Offences of *Abandoning a child, child neglect and cruelty* rose to 91 in that period (an increase of 21.3%) and by 20 incidents to 317 (an increase of 6.7%) in the 12-month period.

#### Annualised total recorded crime falls in quarter 4, 2006

The annualised totals (i.e. the 12-month running total to the end of a quarter) has fallen for the third consecutive quarter. In the third quarter of 2006, the annualised total fell to 104,612 from 104,936 in the preceding period. The figure for the first quarter of 2007 is 102,453, which is a further reduction on the total in quarter four 2,006, which was 103,983.

## **Background Notes**

Introduction

The Headline Crime Statistics release provides provisional figures for the number of headline incidents recorded by An Garda Síochána. A retrospective quarterly series is given to the year 2003. Because of timing issues with respect to the extraction of data (which normally occurs a week after the end of a quarter) figures for the previous quarter are prone to subsequent revision. Also, because of other issues (particularly classification and counting procedures covered below) all data can be revised. This release gives the up-to-date situation for all periods covered.

**Crime recording** 

Incidents reported or which become known to members of An Garda Síochána are recorded when, on the balance of probability, a Garda determines that a criminal offence defined by law has taken place and there is no credible evidence to the contrary. If it is subsequently determined that a criminal offence did not take place the criminal offence recorded is invalidated and is not counted in the statistics. If a person makes a report and subsequently withdraws it by stating that the criminal act did not take place then this too is invalidated unless there is evidence to suggest that by reasonable probability the offence has taken place. For criminal offences where victim confirmation is required (e.g. assault, fraud), a criminal offence is recorded only where the victim confirms the offence or where there is evidence to suggest that by reasonable probability it occurred.

**Crime classification** 

A criminal offence is classified as a particular offence type at the initial recording of that offence. However, upon investigation, it may later become apparent that an alternative offence type should be used. In this event, the record is amended to reflect this. Re-classification on the basis of court proceedings only occurs in relation to homicide offences. A murder offence is reclassified as man-slaughter when a charge of manslaughter commences or when a murder charge results in a conviction for manslaughter. It is also possible, though more rare, that an incident originally classified as manslaughter may be re-classified as murder. Also, a re-classification to a homicide offence occurs when, for example, a serious assault has been recorded and, some time later, the victim dies as a consequence of the assault.

**Headline offences** 

The quarterly figures consist of Headline Offences only, which is part of the classification used by the Gardaí since the year 2000. Included in the headline category are 99 offence types in all, which, in the Garda Annual Report come under the following headings: Homicides, Assaults, Sexual Offences, Arson, Drugs, Thefts, Burglaries, Robberies, Frauds and Other Headline Offences.

General counting rules

Crime counting rules are applied to all criminal offences for the purposes of the statistics. The following are the main rules relevant to the quarterly headline figures:

**Primary Offence Rule:** Where two or more criminal offences are disclosed in a single episode, it is the primary criminal offence that is counted. The primary offence is that offence which the greater penalty may apply. Where offences have similar penalties, offences against the person take precedence over offences against property for the purpose of determining the primary offence.

One Offence Counts Per Victim: One offence counts per victim involved with the exceptions of cheque/credit card fraud and burglary. Under certain circumstances, the cheque/credit card exception necessitates that a series of these offences counts as one crime where the originating bank ultimately suffers the loss. The burglary exception dictates that one burglary offence is counted where property belonging to two or more victims is stolen (or damaged) during a single burglary.

Continuous Series Involving the Same Victim and Same Offender: A continuous series of offences against the same victim involving the same offender counts as one offence.
