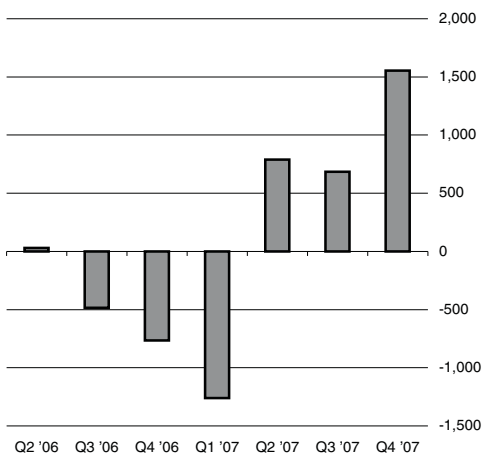

Rise in Murder/Manslaughter incidents in 2007

In 2007, there were 84 *Murder/Manslaughter* incidents recorded by the Gardaí. This is an increase of 17 (25.4%) on the 2006 total of 67 such incidents. The number of recorded incidents of *Murder attempts and threats* rose by 61.2% over the same period, from 103 incidents in 2006 to 166 during 2007. See table 2.

Incidents classified as *Drugs offences* rose from 3,632 in 2006, to 4,423 in 2007, an increase of 21.8%. The largest percentage increase in this category (58.5%) was in *Cultivation, manufacture or importation of drugs* of which there were 214 incidents in 2007.

There were 1,477 incidents of *Sexual Offences* recorded in 2007, a decrease of 10% from the 2006 total.

Incidents classified as *Fraud* rose to 5,713 in 2007, which is an increase of 38.2% on the 2006 figure of 4,133 incidents. In Quarter 4, 2007, *Forgery/False Instrument Offences* rose by 73.2% (to 568) when compared to Quarter 4, 2006.

There were reductions in incidents classified as *Assaults* (0.4%), *Burglaries* (5.1%) and *Robberies* (12.4%) in 2007 when compared to 2006. Over the same period there were increases in offences classified as *Arson* (22.2%), *Thefts* (1.0%) and *Other Headline Offences* (6.9%).

When analysed according to headline offence group the following trends can be observed between 2006 and 2007.

Group 01 - Homicides

Recorded incidents classified under *Homicide* rose from 48 in Quarter 4, 2006 to 63 in Quarter 4, 2007, an increase of just over 31%. *Murder/manslaughter* incidents increased from 19 in Quarter 4, 2006 to 22 in Quarter 4, 2007. In 2007, there were 166 incidents of *Murder attempts/threats*, compared to 103 incidents of this type in 2006, representing an increase of just over 61%.

Group 02 - Assaults

The number of incidents of *Assault causing harm* for 2007 decreased by 179 (4.5%) compared to 2006. The 2007 figure for *Harassment and Endangerment* was 601, an increase of 141 (30.7%) on the 460 recorded in 2006.

Group 03 - Sexual Offences

Comparing figures for Quarter 4, 2007 with the same period in 2006, *Sexual offences* fell by 58 (16.2%). In the same period, *Rape Section 4* and *Rape of a Female* increased by 12.5% and 6.3% respectively.

Group 04 - Arson

In Quarter 4, 2007, there were 559 recorded incidents of *Arson*, an increase of 121 (27.6%) on the same quarter in 2006. In Quarter 4, 2007, there were 1,998 incidents of *Arson*, compared with 1,635 in 2006, an increase of 22.2%.

Group 05 - Drugs

All offences in this category showed increases over the year. Overall, recorded headline drug offences in 2007 rose by 791 (21.8%). The largest offence type in this category, *Possession of drugs for sale or supply*, increased by 595 (19.7%) while recorded *Cultivation, manufacture or importation of drugs* offences increased by 79 (58.5 %) over the year.

Group 06 - Thefts

Offences in this category accounted for 55.9% (58,657) of all headline offences in 2007. Recorded *Thefts from person* were down by 18.3% (from 3,611 to 2,950) in 2007, compared to 2006.

Group 07 - Burglaries

Burglary offences accounted for just over 25% of the total 27,017 headline offences recorded in the fourth quarter of 2007. There was an increase in Quarter 4 for all offence types in the category when compared with Quarter 4, 2006. However, in the whole of 2007, there were reductions of 5.4% and 10.6% for incidents of *Burglary* and *Aggravated Burglary* respectively, when compared to 2006.

Group 08 - Robberies

Both the quarterly and annual recorded figures for *Robbery* decreased in 2007. The number of *Robbery* incidents was 2,090 – a decrease of 296 (12.4%) from 2006. In 2007, recorded offences of *Robbery of an establishment/institution* fell by 293 (26.5%) when compared with 2006.

Group 09 - Frauds

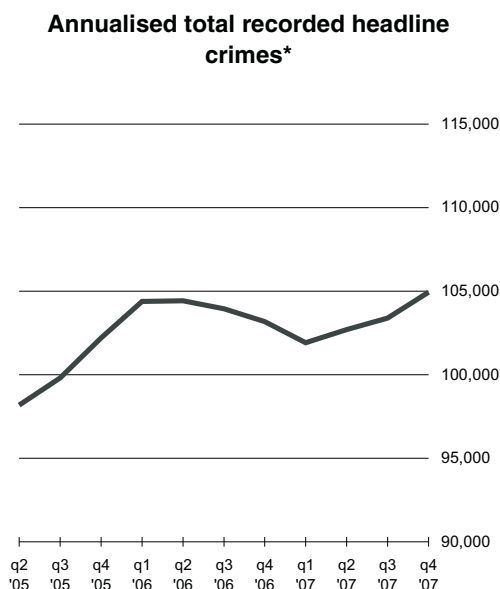
There were 1,453 recorded *Fraud* incidents in Quarter 4, 2007, representing an increase of 357 (32.6%) over the same period in 2006. All incident types in the category increased over this period.

Group 10 - Other Headline Offences

Within the category of Other Headline Offences, the largest absolute change was in recorded instances of *Abandoning a child, child neglect and cruelty*. Between 2006 and 2007, the number of these incidents increased from 303 to 566 (86.8%).

Slight increase in annualised total Headline crime

The annualised totals (i.e. the 12-month running total to the end of a quarter) increased consistently from the second quarter of 2005 to the second quarter of 2006. In the 12-month period ending the second quarter of 2005, the total number of offences recorded was 98,181, compared to 104,427 in the second quarter of 2006, representing an increase of 6.4%. Subsequently, there was a steady decrease in the annualised number of recorded crimes to 101,917 in the first quarter of 2007, a decrease of 2.4% over Quarter 2, 2006. Since Quarter 1 2007, annualised recorded headline crimes have been increasing with Quarter 4 of 2007 having an annualised total of 104,496. See table 1b and graph opposite.

Background Notes

Introduction The Headline Crime Statistics release provides provisional figures for the number of headline incidents recorded by An Garda Síochána. A retrospective quarterly series is given to the year 2004. Because of timing issues with respect to the extraction of data (which normally occurs a week after the end of a quarter) figures for the previous quarter are prone to subsequent revision. Also, because of other issues (particularly classification and counting procedures covered below) all data can be revised. This release gives the up-to-date situation for all periods covered.

Crime recording Incidents reported or which become known to members of An Garda Síochána are recorded when, on the balance of probability, a Garda determines that a criminal offence defined by law has taken place and there is no credible evidence to the contrary. If it is subsequently determined that a criminal offence did not take place the criminal offence recorded is invalidated and is not counted in the statistics. If a person makes a report and subsequently withdraws it by stating that the criminal act did not take place then this too is invalidated unless there is evidence to suggest that by reasonable probability the offence has taken place. For criminal offences where victim confirmation is required (e.g. assault, fraud), a criminal offence is recorded only where the victim confirms the offence or where there is evidence to suggest that by reasonable probability it occurred.

Crime classification A criminal offence is classified as a particular offence type at the initial recording of that offence. However, upon investigation, it may later become apparent that an alternative offence type should be used. In this event, the record is amended to reflect this. Re-classification on the basis of court proceedings only occurs in relation to homicide offences. A murder offence is reclassified as manslaughter when a charge of manslaughter commences or when a murder charge results in a conviction for manslaughter. It is also possible, though more rare, that an incident originally classified as manslaughter may be re-classified as murder. Also, a re-classification to a homicide offence occurs when, for example, a serious assault has been recorded and, some time later, the victim dies as a consequence of the assault.

Headline offences The quarterly figures consist of Headline Offences only, which is part of the classification used by the Gardaí since the year 2000. Included in the headline category are 99 offence types in all, which, in the Garda Annual Report come under the following headings: Homicides, Assaults, Sexual Offences, Arson, Drugs, Thefts, Burglaries, Robberies, Frauds and Other Headline Offences.

General counting rules Crime counting rules are applied to all criminal offences for the purposes of the statistics. The following are the main rules relevant to the quarterly headline figures:

Primary Offence Rule: Where two or more criminal offences are disclosed in a single episode, it is the primary criminal offence that is counted. The primary offence is that offence which the greater penalty may apply. Where offences have similar penalties, offences against the person take precedence over offences against property for the purpose of determining the primary offence.

One Offence Counts Per Victim: One offence counts per victim involved with the exceptions of cheque/credit card fraud and burglary. Under certain circumstances, the cheque/credit card exception necessitates that a series of these offences counts as one crime where the originating bank ultimately suffers the loss. The burglary exception dictates that one burglary offence is counted where property belonging to two or more victims is stolen (or damaged) during a single burglary.

Continuous Series Involving the Same Victim and Same Offender: A continuous series of offences against the same victim involving the same offender counts as one offence.
