Summary Report Prepared for the Public Health Agency

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The impact measurement tool (IMT) is a data collection system used to assess the effectiveness of tier one and tier two drug & alcohol services commissioned by the Public Health Agency (PHA). It is a live data collection system and this report reflects the 2018/19 position at the end of September 2019. It covers services across Northern Ireland and all services that submitted a return during 2018/19 have been included.

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Impact Measurement Tool- Overview of Results

The impact measurement tool (IMT) is a data collection system used to assess the effectiveness of tier one and tier two drug & alcohol services commissioned by the Public Health Agency and is split into the following typologies:

- Adult Treatment (step 2);
- Young Persons Treatment;
- Low Threshold Services;
- Parental Substance Misuse;
- Workforce Development;
- Targeted Prevention.

The main purpose of this report is to inform policy makers within Department of Health and Public Health Agency about the impact Alcohol and Drug projects had on clients and their families in Northern Ireland in 2018/19.

Information is collected before, during and after intervention and is used to measure the impact of the service upon several different aspects of lifestyle and behaviour, referred to as domains.

Data collection & Methodology

The total number of clients recorded has been provided by the Public Health Agency, and is based on the number of clients seen between 1st April 2018 and the 31st March 2019.

In relation to IMT analysis, results for all clients *discharged* between 1st April 2018 and the 31st March 2019 have been included in this report, this includes automatic closure for any client whose record was not closed 6 months (182 days) after the date of their initial assessment. IMT returns represent a live system, updated quarterly by services; the figures included in this release were taken from the *September 2019-20* quarterly returns.

Measuring Impact

In order for the impact of treatment to be measurable, a client record must contain at least two assessments. There are a number of scenarios where it would be expected that a client be discharged without having a subsequent review, for example, an unplanned discharge where a client disengages with service; or if a client is given an immediate referral to a more appropriate service.

Please note that due to the nature of some of the services, not all clients will engage for a duration or level suitable for inclusion on the IMT. For this reason the impact data captured in this report should not be taken as a comprehensive record of the number of clients seen or treated within each service, but as a subset representing those who were suitable for impact measurement. As well as this, it must be remembered that a number of individual clients may have been seen for a large number of sessions.


Adult Treatment

The Adult Treatment typology collects data relating to individuals aged 18 and over, who are receiving step 2 treatment or aftercare for alcohol and / or drug misuse.



Main Substance Used



The following Adult (step 2) domains are measured, each receiving a score of 1 to 8; with 1 indicating highest risk or harm and 8 being lowest risk. The number of impact scores available is indicated by the base number of clients against each Domain.

Note- The high proportion of clients seeing no change in both the Crime and Accommodation domains can be attributed in part to their first assessment being at the top of the scale (i.e. no criminal activity or satisfactory accommodation), thus no improvement could be made.

Youth Treatment

The Youth Treatment typology covers the provision of community based early intervention services for young people aged 11 - 25 who are identified as having substance misuse difficulties.



Main Substance Used



The following Youth treatment domains are measured, each given a score of 1 to 4; with 1 indicating highest risk or harm and 4 being lowest risk. The number of impact scores available is indicated by the base number of clients against each Domain.

Parental Substance Misuse

The Parental Substance Misuse typology collects data relating to the provision of therapeutic services for children, young people and families affected by parental substance misuse; it measures the progress of clients involved with these services across a number of key domains.



Low Threshold Services


Low threshold services IMT

The low threshold services typology covers the provision of support, care, facilitation and harm reduction services for people who are misusing substances; it measures the progress of clients involved with these services across a number of key domains. It should be noted that information from Belfast Drug Outreach Team is not included.

Total number of clients on IMT = 898




Low Threshold Domains

The following Low Threshold domains are measured, each receiving a score of 0, 1 or 2; with 2 indicating highest risk or harm and 0 being lowest risk. The number of impact scores available is indicated by the base number of clients against each Domain.

Average score at initial and final assessments







Workforce Development


The Workforce Development typology collects data from agencies providing Workforce Development training for Alcohol and Drug workers. Participants complete a pre-course questionnaire to establish base knowledge, and similarly a post-course questionnaire including a rating for course relevance. The assessments are scored from one (lowest) to five (highest).

During 2018/19, of the **1,033** number of Attendees at **99** workforce development courses across agencies in Northern Ireland.


Work Sector of Attendees

Targeted Prevention

The Targeted Prevention typology covers the provision of substance misuse education courses to young people in the form of life skills or harm reduction sessions. Attendees are asked a series of questions before and after training events regarding their behaviour (alcohol and drug use), knowledge (effects / risks & harm of alcohol and drugs) and attitudes (getting help for problem use and making decisions about alcohol/drug use).

During 2018/19, **246** courses were undertaken with **2,059** young people recorded as having commenced the training and **1,981** young people as having completed.

Participants are asked to rate their knowledge on the following areas

Decisions, decisions – it's your choice

How much do you know about the process of decision making?

Say what? - Effective Communication Skills

How would you rate your own communication skills?

When the going gets tough - dealing with difficult emotions

How good are you at recognising your feelings/emotions?

Health = Wealth? Looking after your health & wellbeing

How much do you know about good health and wellbeing?

Like or Dislike - Media and its influence

How much do you know about the influence of media?




