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## **TALLAGHT REHABILITATION PROJECT CLG MISSION STATEMENT:**

TRP promotes a healthy lifestyle in a structured and safe way, through education and training. From this, participants are encouraged to make an informed choice to ultimately become and remain drug/alcohol free.

### **Values:**

Tallaght Rehabilitation Project values and respects the rights and confidentiality of all our participants to engage in a recovery process that is, honest, dignified, supportive, compassionate, and positive and strives to meet the needs of our clients through evaluation and development.

### **Commitment and Vision:**

The TRP organization is committed to providing quality services for people who are in recovery from drug and alcohol addiction. Our organization and programmes strive to provide quality based services that are evidenced based and promote good governance to become a leader in community based therapeutic rehabilitation.

### **Introduction and Background:**

Tallaght Rehabilitation Project CLG is a community-based rehabilitation day programme and aftercare Service for people in recovery from drugs, alcohol, and cross addictions. We provide a service for the Tallaght Wide area, which is based in West Tallaght but also covers Whitechurch (Rathfarnham) in our service provision. Working from a therapeutic and holistic ethos, the programmes aim to provide opportunities to enable participants to actively address behavioural issues which underpin addiction problems and to develop and enhance life skills and facilitate personal growth and recovery.

TRP was established in 1997 as a community response to the spiraling drug problem in the Tallaght area. TRP is supported by Tallaght Drugs and Alcohol Task Force, The Department of Employment and Social Protection, The Health Service Executive and South Dublin County Council. According to the 2016 census, Tallaght had a population of 76,119. This figure is still rising along with high unemployment, early school leaving, poverty and social deprivation. Initially Tallaght Rehabilitation Project was originally given a space in the local church St. Thomas in Jobstown to provide rehabilitation for people in the Tallaght area who wanted to address addiction issues and enter into recovery process. In July 2005 TRP moved into Kiltalown House which is ideal for the Day Programme and Aftercare services which we provide.

Hello Everyone,

I would like to welcome you to the Managers' Report for the TRP organisational Annual Review 2021. I would also like to thank you for taking the time to view this report and I hope you find our annual review both interesting and informative. In March of 2021, the country and the world were into the second year of the Covid-19 pandemic, and once again, like the year previous in 2020, it was a very difficult time for everyone. It was a difficult time for us here at TRP too. It was a very insecure time for staff and clients alike as we were in and out of various lockdowns and restrictions whilst we all waited patiently on our vaccines. We had to chop and change our services and structures to meet the different health criteria being suggested by the NPHET and the HSE.

However, once again our excellent staff team responded accordingly making sure that we kept to our contingency plans to provide a full supportive service to all our clients and their families who engaged in the TRP programmes. Early in the year, we facilitated all our clients to attend the facility here at Kiltalown house for group therapy, key working, care planning sessions, and relapse prevention modules. We then were able to progress to open the facility for other programme initiatives.

All the team worked hard on arranging our Annual Residential and our Boxsmart Fitness and Training Module. We even planned a Celebration of Recovery Part 2. I am delighted to say that before 2021 ended, we had completed our residential in October where we took twelve clients and six staff to the Cavan Centre for four days and facilitated an excellent therapeutic and fun residential. We also facilitated our Boxsmart module from late October into November. In September, we had a great time organising the Celebration of Recovery event which took place here at Kiltalown house and a fabulous night was had by all. We would like to say a big thank you to all the acts that took part, especially our drama group who through the excellent tuition of the tutor, Thomas O' Reilly, performed another powerful piece of work around challenging stigma in recovery. We were also able to start arranging for some outside facilitators to deliver modules to our clients here at TRP.

As the year progressed the team and I meet on several occasions to develop our yearly strategic work plan for the year ahead. We also begin the process of slowly and safely moving back towards full therapeutic services and structures for our day programme and aftercare. I am happy to say that since November/December of 2021, we reached that goal and were back at full steam with all our services. We are also now fully compliant with the charity regulator having completed the necessary protocol in 2021.

Tallaght Rehabilitation Project collaboratively engaged with many other services and agencies throughout 2021, including our main funders - the HSE, where we meet with them to discuss our Service agreements and other programme resources. We also collaboratively engaged with the Department of Social Protection where we signed a new contract for our Mainstream and Special Category CE programmes. The Management of TRP also done a lot of work with our colleagues in other treatment, rehabilitation, and family support frontline services in the Tallaght wide area through the FMC (Frontline Managers Committee) and the Tallaght Drugs and Alcohol Task Force among others.

We were also able to facilitate some placements from Tallaght University and other colleges. These placement students gained valuable experience with working with both the clients and the staff.

I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge the good work of our financial administrator Joan, who, along with myself kept a close eye on all our finances and insured that all monies allocated to TRP CLG were spent wisely for the needs of our programmes, clients, and staff. We also had a good liaison with the local Volunteer Bureau, and I would like to thank all the volunteers who have offered their precious time and energy in supporting our organisation in 2021. 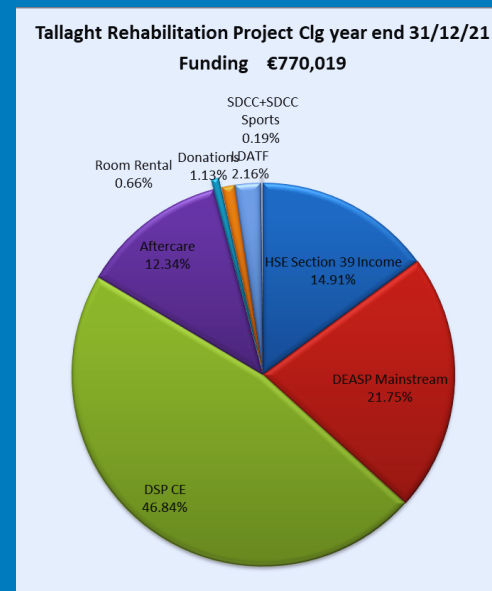


# FINANCIAL ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT 2021

The chart on the right is a breakdown of the grants TRP received in 2021 from the following Statutory bodies, the DSP (Mainstream and CE), HSE, LDATF, South Dublin County Council and South Dublin County Sports Partnership. TRP received donations from MABS, Amazon, the Irish Courts and also received donations from local businesses. Some of these donations were monitory and some were goods and services. Donations and funding generated from room rental is used to supplement statutory funding in order to maintain a quality service and a well-run facility with up to date Health & Safety Standards and Covid-19 Procedures.

## **DSP (DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL PROTECTION) CE SUPERVISOR'S COMMUNITY REPORT 2021**

In 2021, we were met with the same challenges as 2020, Covid-19 was still hugely prevalent, Government restrictions were changing regularly, which we adhered to as directed. Despite Covid-19 and the subsequent restrictions imposed on us the staff teams again rose to the challenge, our organization continued to deliver a comprehensive Therapeutic Day Programme to our Special category clients.

At full capacity our numbers are 21 coded special category rehab places and 8 Community employment support staff. These places would be in positions of reception staff, gardening, maintenance, and housekeeping. The CE scheme is funded by the Department of Social Protection. The CE support staff places are designed for people who are in long term unemployment, and to assist them through training and education back into mainstream work.

Recruiting CE support staff during 2021 has proven difficult, We had three support places filled out of eight. So, it is very important that we continue to advertise the remaining places and hope to be more successful in 2022. The CE scheme is interwoven with the therapeutic services delivered at Kiltalown House. Career guidance through the delivery of a specific Individual Learner Plan (ILP) remains one of the main focuses of the programme. In 2021, nine participants engaged in our Step-Up programme and graduated the Day Programme and Aftercare Services, They progressed into various areas of employment and education.

During the ILP sessions, education/training is discussed and sourced if needed, ILP is an important part of a special category participants recovery. It's a foundation to build on as they work towards building a structure for themselves after treatment to return to education and/or mainstream employment. Support staff also benefit from ILP. It gives them the opportunity to explore opportunities of advancement on completion of their CE placement.

Sourcing training for our special category clients proved to be somewhat difficult in 2021, most available training was online which did not always suit our structures in TRP. We did however manage to employ outside facilitators in areas such as Holistic, Health & Safety training, Drama and Yoga.

Tallaght Rehabilitation Project knows that placements for college students studying social care is vital and have always supported this. In 2021, we facilitated two 3rd level students from Technological University Dublin. TRP will continue to facilitate University students.

Volunteers are very important to our organization. During 2021, we were lucky enough to have approximately nine volunteers working in areas such as Reception, Therapeutic & Web Design (TRP Website).

The CE department has two assistant supervisors - Peter Henry and Martin Nugent, I would like to take this opportunity to thank them both for their hard work and commitment throughout the year. I would also like to thank all our funders and sponsors who engaged with TRP in 2021. We look forward to working with you all again in the future.

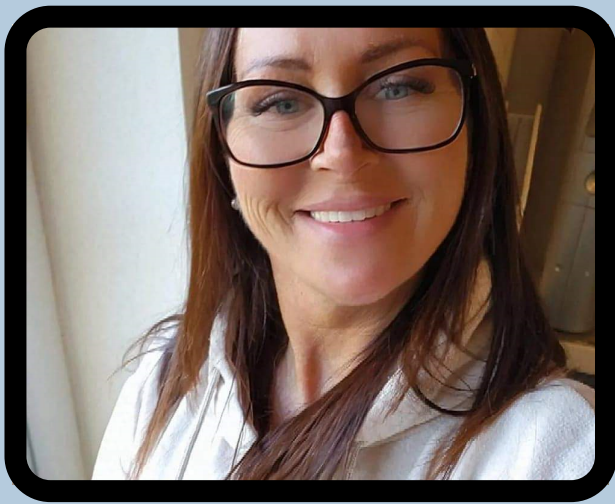

Hi, Lorraine Thompson here - Health & Safety / Covid Officer in Tallaght Rehabilitation Project. The following is my Health & Safety report for 2021.

Health and Safety was a big part of TRP in 2021 due to Covid. As a result of these unprecedented times that we found ourselves in, it was paramount that as an organisation and an essential service to the Tallaght wide area that we continued to provide the services to our clients with safety in mind.

We concentrated our efforts in relation to safety by monitoring client and staff temperatures, daily, when they entered the building. Hand sanitizers and masks were always provided for all rooms. Each room was regularly sanitized before and after every session. These safety measures worked well throughout the year.

As a result of our conscientious attitude, the staff here at TRP were able to operate to full capacity, five days per week which provided a safe structure for both staff and clients.

Despite Covid, we overcame challenges in training and refreshing staff in Health and Safety. As most organizations could not deliver training onsite during Covid, we adapted and sourced First Aid Training for staff members online through Zoom with STAC training to ensure that the Health and Safety awareness of our staff was prioritized. STAC Training sent out mannequins for staff to train with and apps were used to record chest compressions. As a result, four members of our staff team were certified in First Aid training.



In 2021, three Risk Assessments were carried out in the facility as normal. Fire and Safety runs were facilitated with fifteen clients in 2021. Two Fire drills were performed as per usual.

In December 2021, we provided a family Christmas day for our clients and their children. The day was a great success. For Health and Safety purposes, we had a system rota for the clients where one family at a time went to see Santa here in our homemade grotto in TRP.

Overall, all Health and Safety procedures were regularly reviewed by the management team in 2021 in Managerial and Team meetings. We adhered to Government Guidelines, monitored any changes, and adapted accordingly.

As Health and Safety Officer, I am proud of the work the organization has achieved regarding our contingency and risk assessment plans. Our overall response to Covid-19 has been a positive one and our values on Health and Safety never changed.

Our Health and Safety Standards will remain consistent throughout 2022.

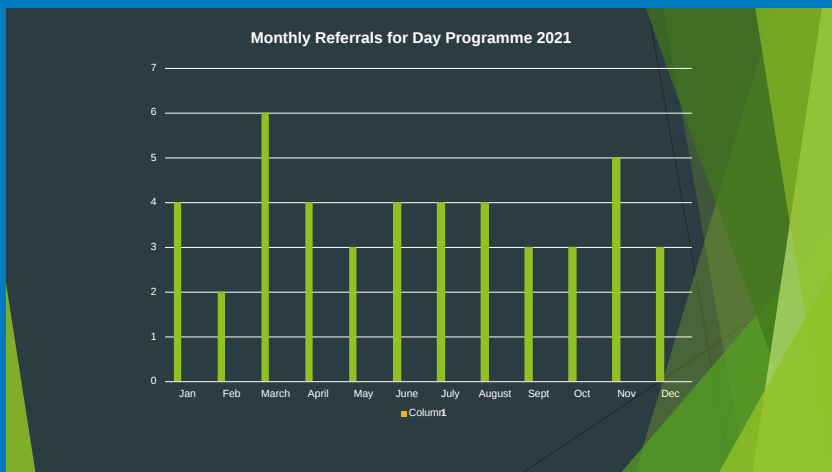

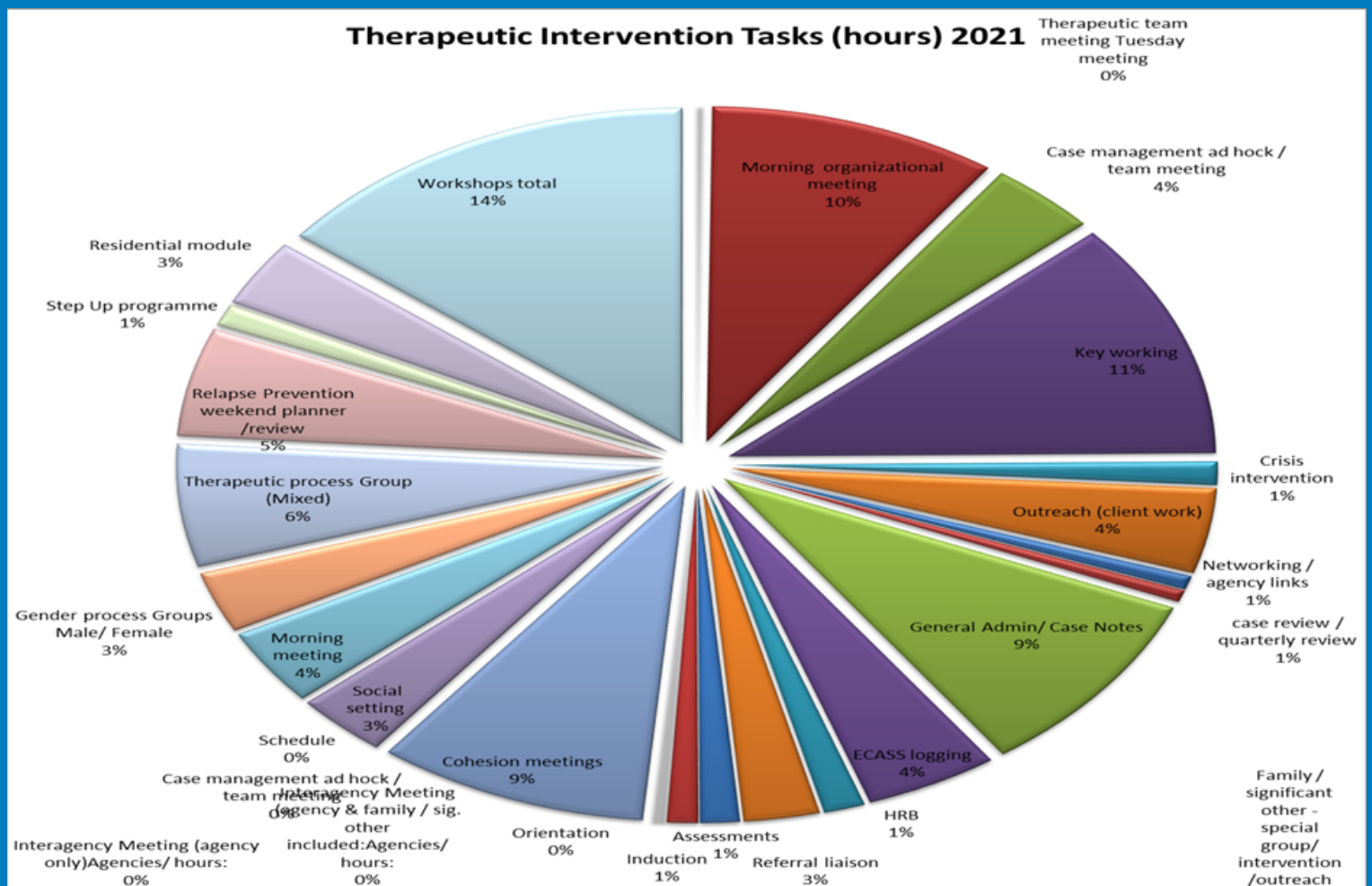
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## FULL THERAPEUTIC INTERVENTIONS ORGANISATIONAL TASKS IN 2021.

BELOW IS A PIE CHART OF FULL THERAPEUTIC INTERVENTIONS ORGANISATIONAL TASKS IN 2021.



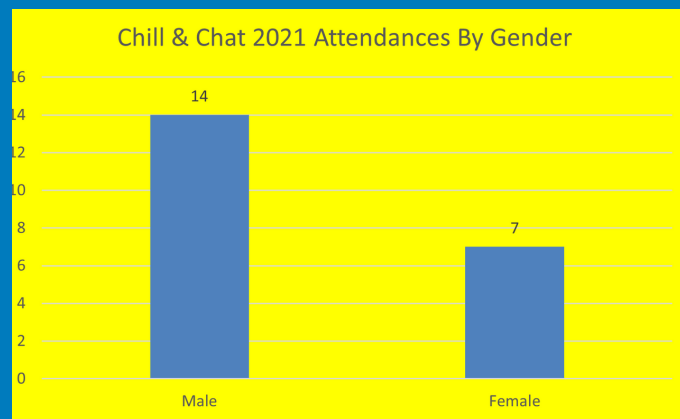
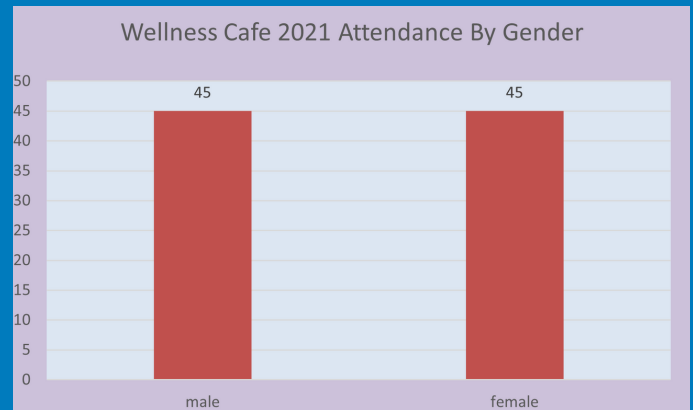
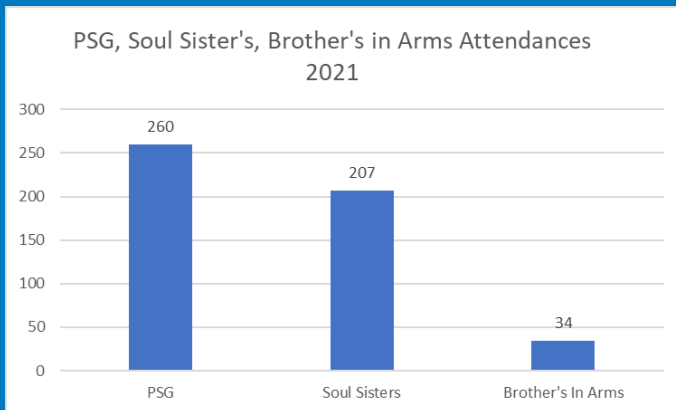

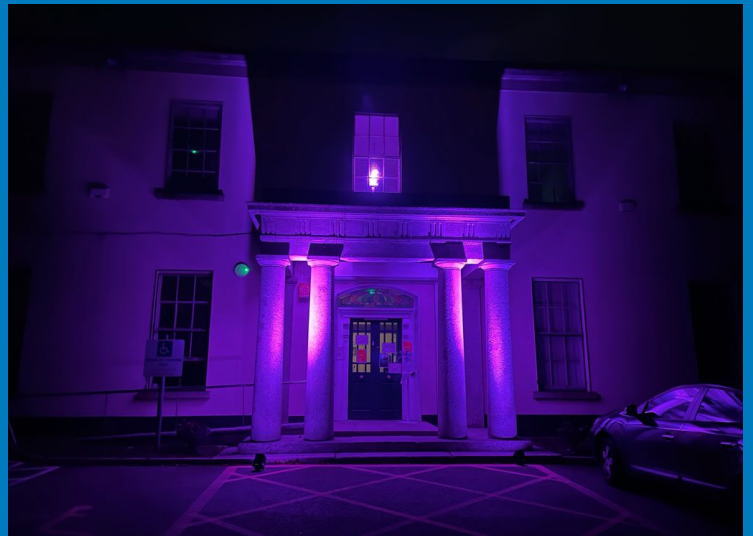
