The purpose of this document is to provide a resource for emergency service call handlers to appropriately identify, categorise and coordinate the response to emergency call outs involving drugs.

It includes key street names of common drugs as well as brief descriptions of drug types and categories.

Drug names can change over time. Is there a common name we have missed out? Let us know at **phs.drugsradar@phs.scot**

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Section title: e.g. Cannabinoids

This is the name of the category of drug. Drugs in the same category have similar effects.

Name, e.g. cannabis

This is the full name of the drug.

Important note

The drug taken may not always be the drug that it's expected to be. It may contain adulterants, be mis-sold or contain a different amount than anticipated.

Effects

These are the main effects of the drug category as reported in the resources. Effects are subjective and depend on the drug, set and setting.

Factors influencing overall effect include:

- **Drug** type, frequency, amount, quality, route of administration and what it is mixed with.
- **Set** person's age, sex, health, wellbeing, knowledge, experience and reasons for use.
- Setting company, support, location and time.

Overdose signs

These are the most common signs of an overdose as reported in the resources. This list is not extensive.

There's a greater risk of overdose if someone mixes drugs, takes drugs alone, takes drugs after a break, takes more or higher-purity drugs than they are used to, or injects drugs.

Names

To inform the content of this resource PHS created a Drugs A–Z survey asking participants to rank street names using a scale of 1–5 where 1 means 'never heard before' and 5 means 'very common'. Participants were also asked to share common names not included in the survey. Each street name was given an average score from over 250 responses.

Names scoring:

- 4–5 are 'very common'
- 3–3.9 are 'common'
- less than 3 are classed as 'other'

We encourage people looking at this resource to learn the very common names for each drug. Where applicable, UK brand names are also given. As the street drugs market is unregulated, branding is no guarantee of contents.

Important note

Polydrug use is the use of more than one drug at a time. Polydrug use increases the risk of drug harms and death. This includes mixing alcohol with other drugs. Cannabinoids are compounds that interact with the endocannabinoid system. They are found in the cannabis plant or can be produced synthetically in a laboratory.

Effects

anxiety, calmness, dry mouth, euphoria, increased heart rate, nausea, paranoia, red eyes, relaxation

Overdose signs

clammy skin, dizziness, severe nausea and vomiting, paleness, panic/fear, rapid heart rate

Cannabinoid hyperemesis syndrome (CHS)

CHS is a chronic sickness condition caused by the regular and prolonged use of cannabinoids. Symptoms include anxiety, cold sweats, constant feelings of nausea, diarrhoea, painful stomach cramps and vomiting.

1.1 Cannabis

Cannabis is a plant containing hundreds of cannabinoids, most notably THC (tetrahydrocannabinol) and CBD (cannabidiol).

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Other names refer to cannabis when it is in the form of a joint or rolled into a cigarette: doobie, J, jay, joint, spliff, zoot.

Names specifically used to refer to cannabis concentrates (products with a high level of THC) include budder, butane hash oil, oil, shatter.

1.2 Cannabis edibles

Edibles are food or drink products containing cannabis, often sweet products like cakes, sweets, juice or syrups. When swallowed, the effects take longer to come on and last longer than when inhaled.

Brand names

Edibles are often referred to by the name on the packet and the packet may use words such as 'THC', 'canna' or 'medicated'. They are often named after popular American sweet brands. Names include: air bites, air heads, calibo, canna ropes, canna burst, caribo, dank bites, gas heads, gushers, jolly ranchers, millions, nerd rope, peach-os, skittles, stoner patch dummies/sour patch kids, trolli, wonka bars.

Important note

Branding is no guarantee of ingredients or quality and contents of products with the same name can vary widely.





1.3 Synthetic cannabinoids

'Synthetic cannabinoids' is a term used to describe over 200 lab-made drugs that interact with the endocannabinoid system.



Often their effects are more harmful and unpredictable than cannabis.

In addition to general cannabinoid effects, synthetic cannabinoid effects include aggression, detachment from reality, difficulty moving, heart palpitations, increased heart rate, nausea, pallor, paranoia, red eyes and slurred speech.

Overdose signs

difficulty breathing, chest pains, psychosis, seizures, severe nausea and vomiting, snoring, unconsciousness

Important note

In the UK, vape oils and edibles sold as containing cannabis have been found to contain synthetic cannabinoids, which are significantly more harmful to health.



Depressant drugs depress the central nervous system (reduce heart rate and breathing).

Effects

blackouts, calmness, coma-like sleep, decreased breathing, decreased heart rate, drowsiness, euphoria, hypnotic (sleep-inducing), memory loss, relaxation, slowed/slurred speech

Overdose signs

blue/pale tingeing to lips and skin, cold and clammy skin, confusion, difficulty breathing, seizures, severe nausea and vomiting, slow or erratic pulse, snoring, unconsciousness

Important note

High risk especially when taken in high doses or mixed with other drugs.

2.1 Alcohol

Alcohol is a depressant drug. The alcohol found in alcoholic drinks is ethanol.



Names

bevvy, booze, drink

It is common for alcohol to referred to by its type such as vodka, beer and rum, or by its brand name such as Smirnoff, Tennent's and Bacardi.

2.2 Benzodiazepines

Benzodiazepines are depressant drugs with sedative and anxiolytic (anti-anxiety) effects. They are also known as tranquilisers.

2.3 Gabapentinoids

Gabapentinoids are a group of depressant drugs, including gabapentin and pregabalin, that can be prescribed to treat epilepsy and neuropathic pain.

2.4 **GHB/GBL**

GHB (gamma-hydroxybutyrate) and GBL

(gamma-butyrolactone) are similar – GBL converts to GHB shortly after it enters the body. They are depressant drugs with sedating properties and are sometimes referred to as 'date rape' drugs in the media.

2.5 **Z-drugs**

Z-drugs are a group of depressant drugs similar to benzodiazepines that can be prescribed to aid sleep and treat insomnia.

Dissociatives are a category of drugs that can alter perceptions of reality, similar to psychedelics or hallucinogens. Some are used in medicine as anaesthetic and analgesic drugs.

Effects

analgesic (painkilling), calmness, detachment, dizziness, euphoria, feeling floaty, hallucinations, numbness, reduced coordination, relaxation, stimulation, time distortion, unconsciousness, unawareness

Overdose signs

cold and clammy skin, difficulty breathing, panic, fear, seizures, severe nausea and vomiting, slow or erratic pulse, snoring, unconsciousness

3.1 Ketamine

Ketamine is a dissociative drug with painkilling effects that is usually found as a white crystalline/ shard-like powder.



Important note

Repeated, high doses of ketamine can cause serious (and sometimes permanent) damage to the urinary tract and bladder. Symptoms of damage include cramps, abdominal pain, difficulty urinating, frequently urinating and blood in urine.

3.2 Nitrous oxide

Nitrous oxide is a clear, colourless gas that gives short-lasting dissociative effects. It is sometimes known as laughing gas as effects may include bursts of uncontrolled laughter.

Important note

Repeated, high doses of nitrous oxide can cause serious (and sometimes permanent) nerve damage. Symptoms of damage include difficulty moving, loss of balance, loss of coordination, numbness and tingling in fingers/toes and arms/legs. Nitrous oxide is commonly inhaled from a balloon. Inhaling nitrous oxide from anything placed over or strapped to the head (such as a bag or mask) can cause suffocation and death.

Image and performance enhancing drugs (IPEDs)

IPEDs are a category of substances that are used to enhance appearance, strength and physical performance. They include steroids that are used to build muscle.

Steroid effects

acne, aggression, difficulty sleeping, heart damage, high blood pressure, increased weight, increased strength, fluid retention, libido changes, liver damage

Opioid drugs act on opioid receptors to produce painkilling effects. In the Scottish Ambulance Service call handling systems, opioids are referred to as narcotics.

Effects

analgesic (painkilling), calmness, euphoria, decreased breathing, decreased heart rate, nausea, pinpoint pupils, unconsciousness

Overdose signs

blue/pale tingeing to lips and skin, cold and clammy skin, confusion, difficulty breathing, pinpoint pupils, seizures, severe nausea and vomiting, slow or erratic pulse, snoring, unconsciousness

Important note High risk especially when taken in high doses or mixed with other drugs.

5.1 Buprenorphine

Buprenorphine is an opioid drug commonly prescribed as an opioid substitution therapy.

5.2 Diamorphine (heroin)

Heroin is an opioid drug usually found as a brown powder.

Some names are used to describe the quantity of heroin such as 'tenner bag' (commonly sold in £10 deals for 100–200 mg of heroin) and 20 bag.

5.3 Methadone

Methadone is an opioid drug commonly prescribed as an opioid substitution therapy. It's most commonly seen as a green liquid, which is swallowed.

Psychedelic drugs are also known as hallucinogens or trips. They can alter senses and give a sense of spiritual connection.

Effects

altered senses and thinking, anxiety, enhanced colour and sounds, euphoria, nausea and vomiting, paranoia, reduced appetite, sense of spiritual connection, time distortion, visual geometry, wakefulness

Overdose signs

aggression, agitation, confusion, panic/fear, psychosis, suicidal thoughts, severe nausea and vomiting, violence

6.1 **2Cs**

The 2Cs are a family of psychedelic drugs with stimulant effects and similar chemical properties.

Types of 2C drug 2C-B, 2C-C, 2C-D, 2C-E, 2C-I, 2C-P

6.2 **DMT**

DMT (dimethyltryptamine) is a powerful psychedelic drug that can produce short-lived intense effects.

Names dimitri, god molecule, spirit molecule







6.3 **LSD**

Very common

acid, LSD

LSD (lysergic acid diethylamide) is a psychedelic drug, usually found as small squares of blotting paper or micro-dots (very small tablets/'tabs').

6.4 Psilocybin

Psilocybin is a psychedelic drug found in species of psychoactive mushrooms.

Stimulant drugs stimulate the central nervous system, which also increases heart rate and breathing.

Effects

alertness, aggression, anxiety, chattiness, confidence, difficulty sleeping, dry mouth, dilated pupils, energy, euphoria, focus, increased concentration, increased heart rate, jaw clenching or teeth grinding, paranoia, restlessness, reduced appetite, sexual arousal

Overdose signs

chest pains, difficulty breathing, extreme fear or panic, hallucinations, hyperthermia (overheating), psychosis, rapid heart rate, rigid muscles, seizures, severe nausea and vomiting

7.1 Amphetamine

Amphetamine is a long-lasting synthetic (lab-made) stimulant drug, usually found as a white, off-white or pinkish powder.

7.2 Cocaine

Cocaine is a short-lasting stimulant drug, made by processing the leaves of the coca plant.



Important note

Cocaine is particularly harmful to the heart. It causes the heart muscles to thicken and blood vessels to constrict. This makes it difficult for blood to circulate and can cause heart attacks. This risk is increased when alcohol is mixed with cocaine, creating a third substance called cocaethylene.

Cocaine powder

Cocaine is most commonly found as a fine white powder.

Some names are used to describe the perceived quality of the cocaine such as 'council' or 'cooncil' (low), 50/50 (middle), gucci, prop, pure, puro (high).

Other names refer to cocaine by its form or packaging such as bag, lines, powder or packet.

Crack cocaine

Crack cocaine is a solid form made by combining cocaine powder with baking soda, water and heat (washing). This forms rocks that can be smoked (heated and inhaled).

7.3 **MDMA**

MDMA (3,4-methylenedioxymethamphetamine) is a stimulant drug that produces feelings of empathy and euphoria. It is commonly found in pill or powder forms.

It is common for ecstasy pills to be referred to by their logo. Most pills will be pressed with popular logos/brands/characters such as Tesla, Red Bull, Bugatti and The Punisher, or recognisable pictures such as emojis, foods and animals.

7.4 Mephedrone

Mephedrone is a stimulant drug also known as 4-MMC (4-methylmethcathinone). It also produces feelings of empathy and is most commonly found as a fine or crystal white powder.



In Scotland, mephedrone is also used as a generic name to refer to other cathinones such as 4-CMC and 3-CMC.

7.5 Methamphetamine

Methamphetamine is amphetamine with an added methyl group. It is longer lasting than amphetamine and is usually found as clear, colourless crystals that can be smoked.

7.6 Study drugs

Study drugs are stimulants usually taken with the intention of promoting wakefulness and improving cognitive ability, focus or concentration.



They are also called smart drugs, cognitive enhancers or nootropics, but these terms can also be used to describe a wider range of substances (including food supplements) that are used to enhance performance.

7.7 Other stimulant drugs

Nicotine

A stimulant that is commonly inhaled and found in cigars, cigarettes and vapes. It is also found in patches, gum and lozenges.

Caffeine

A stimulant that is commonly ingested in a drink and found in tea, coffee, fizzy drinks and energy drinks. It is also found in tablet and powder form.

Khat/qat

Stimulant leaves from the khat plant that are chewed or brewed in tea.

Volatile substances are gases or chemicals that evaporate at room temperature to form a vapour that can be inhaled. Inhaling these products is known as huffing, buzzing and sniffing. They are found in a range of legal household products. They are depressant drugs that reduce heart rate and breathing.

Effects

confusion, dilated pupils, dizziness, drowsiness, hallucinations, lack of coordination, reduced breathing, reduced heart rate, rushing, slurred speech

Overdose signs

blue/pale tingeing to lips and skin, confusion, difficulty breathing, seizures, severe nausea and vomiting, unconsciousness

Important note

Inhaling volatile substances can cause sudden death.

9.1 Other medicines

Antidepressants

Antidepressants are medicines that can be prescribed to treat clinical depression. There are six broad types:

- monoamine oxidase inhibitor (MAOI)
- noradrenaline and specific serotonergic antidepressant (NASSA)
- selective serotonin reuptake inhibitor (SSRI)
- serotonin antagonists and reuptake inhibitor (SARI)
- serotonin noradrenaline reuptake inhibitor (SNRI)
- tricyclic antidepressant (TCA)

9.2 New psychoactive substances

New psychoactive substances (NPS) are drugs that have similar effects to controlled drugs but have not been specifically covered by the Misuse of Drugs Act 1971.

The effect, duration and appearance of each NPS varies, but most come in powder, pill or 'herbal' form.

The Psychoactive Substances Act 2016 (the 2016 Act) came into force in May 2016. It bans the manufacture, export and import and supply (or offer to supply) of all substances capable of producing a psychoactive effect. Possession is not always an offence, except in a 'custodial institution' (such as a prison).

Poppers, alcohol, nicotine and tobacco, caffeine and medicines are exempt from the 2016 Act. Nitrous oxide is exempt when used in food preparation (usually as a propellant for whipped cream).

Since the introduction of this Act, NPS have become part of the mainstream drug supply and are therefore not listed separately in this resource.

Previous NPS names

legal highs, bath salts, plant food, incense

9.3 Poppers

Alkyl nitrates (poppers) are sold in liquid form, which is inhaled for a muscle relaxing and rushing effect.

They are sold in small bottles under misleading names such as air freshener or room odouriser, or under brand names such as Amsterdam Gold, Rush and TNT.

Important note Drinking poppers is extremely dangerous and can cause death.
