INTRODUCTION

The mission of the Irish Prison Service (IPS) is to provide safe, secure and humane custody for people who are sent to prison. The IPS is committed to managing custodial sentences in a way which encourages and supports prisoners in their endeavouring to live law abiding and purposeful lives as valued members of society.

The pernicious nature of the problems caused by the presence of harmful drugs in prisons, and in communities, has been well-documented. The incursion of illicit drugs to the prison environment poses a number of challenges and problems for prisoners and prison-based staff, not only in terms of the negative health issues caused by addiction, but also by increasing threats to safe custody and good order as manifested in acts of violence, selfharm, bullying and other criminal activity.

The purpose of the Irish Prison Service Drugs Strategy 2023-2026 is primarily to update the commitments of the IPS Keeping Drugs Out of Prison Strategy, and to set out clear measures to be taken by the IPS to tackle the problem of substances of abuse in prisons over the next three years. For the purposes of this document, the generic terms of 'drugs' and 'substances of abuse' will be used to refer to both illicit and prescribed drugs controlled under Misuse of Drugs legislation, and any substance abused for any physiological and/or psychoactive response in the user. The Irish Prison Service seeks to confront the issue of substances of abuse in prisons with the following interactive components to our approach:





It must be recognised that the prison environment mirrors the same range of activity and challenges arising in many communities grappling with the scourge of illicit drug use. In order to meaningfully tackle the issue of substances of abuse in prisons, the Irish Prison Service must work in partnership with all agencies across the criminal justice sector, additional support agencies that are active in Irish prisons, and relevant community-based organisations to achieve the goals of this strategy together.
