On behalf of our members, I am delighted and honoured to present the 2023 Annual Report for Water Safety Ireland.

Overall drowning rates have continued to decrease over the decades. Drowning statistics for 2023 indicate that 78 people drowned, which is down from 93 drownings in 2022. This continues a downward trend. In each of the ten years to 2021, 130 drowned. In each of the five years to 2021, 118 drowned. I would like to take this opportunity to express my sincere thanks to each of the Committees, Commissions, Working Groups, Water Safety Area Committees and Head Office staff who have remained focused throughout the year – however this remains a significant public health issue and it must remain our main focus to continue efforts to bring this figure down further.

Water Safety Ireland volunteers have been busy nationwide teaching swimming, lifesaving, basic life support, rescue skills and promoting water safety awareness to the public. Over 100,000 water safety certificates were presented to recipients throughout the year enormous work from our team of teachers and instructors, who strive to change attitudes and behaviours in and around water. I commend our Water Safety Area Committees, and our Summer and Winter Course Organisers for their commitment to delivering essential training to the next generation of lifesavers. During 2023, WSI issued swimming and lifesaving certificates to 8,796 people. 2,266 candidates received certification as beach and pool lifequards. Local Authority Lifeguards rescued 249 people from drowning at lifeguarded locations nationwide. These Lifeguards administered first aid on 5,390 ocassions and reunited 187 lost children with their quardians.

The Sports Commission ran a packed programme of lifesaving competitions in 2023, culminating in the European Junior and Senior Championships, in Poland and Belgium. Record numbers of competitors participated in our competitions in 2023. Competitors ranged in age from eight years to sixty-five years – making lifesaving sport truly a whole-of-life "Sport for All".

Water Safety Ireland had a strong presence across the media in 2023, with high profile campaigns taking place as part of the 'Better Safe Than Sorry' message. We coordinated efforts to deliver practical water safety advice to the public via traditional and digital channels, reaching a range of at-risk groups nationwide.

Water Safety Ireland closed the year with presentations by WSI members at the World Congress on Drowning Prevention, a forum dedicated to highlighting water safety best practices from around the world. We are very proud that the activities of Water Safety Ireland featured strongly on this world stage in drowning prevention.

World Drowning Prevention Day featured strongly among WSI members and members of the public to raise awareness about Ireland's drowning burden. World Drowning Prevention Day took place on the 25th of July, incorporating the theme 'Do One Thing, Improve One Thing, Add One Thing' to prevent drowning. Water Safety Ireland volunteers once again went above and beyond to mark the day.

Our organisation has made many important strides in recent years We continue our work implementing our five-year Strategic Development Plan that guides the work of Water Safety Ireland in conjunction with Ireland's ten-year National Drowning Prevention Strategy 2018-2027. Behind these plans are real people – our voluntary members who are driven to tackle water safety issues and promote the development of appropriate skills, attitudes and behaviours. We are all working together on our first and foremost goal - to reduce drownings in Ireland.

Finally, I thank each and every member of our organisation for their efforts to bring drownings down in 2023. I look forward with confidence to the continued downward trend in drownings and to the development of the cohort of volunteers within our organisation.

Together we really can bring drownings down.

Water Safety Area Committees

The organisation has thirty Water Safety Area Committees, arranged almost on a county basis plus the Defence Forces and the Gárda Siochana Water Safety Area Committees. Much recognition must be afforded to these Water Safety Area Committees who devise a programme of events and courses to cover their areas for the year. In addition to delivering water safety promotional programmes and demonstrations at schools, colleges, businesses, exhibitions and community events, each Committee delivers an extensive programme of pool water safety sessions in the winter and beach, lake and river water safety sessions in the summer.

The official membership structure is of a voluntary nature with over five thousand members nationwide. It operates on a number of different levels: Life Governors, Examiners, Trainee Examiners, Tutors, Instructors, Trainee Instructors and Non-Technical Volunteer Organisers. Each Local Authority has a Water Safety Development Officer who is a member of Water Safety Ireland.

Thanks to all their efforts to promote water safety we have seen a significant increase in the development of water safety awareness in local communities.



What We Do

Water Safety Ireland (WSI) is the statutory, voluntary body, and registered charity established to promote water safety and reduce drownings in Ireland.

Our focus is on public awareness and education. Tragically, an average of 118 people drowned in Ireland per year from 2017 to 2021. We strive to reduce these fatalities by changing attitudes and behaviours so that our aquatic environments can be enjoyed with confidence and safety.

Education

- a) An education syllabus that teaches swimming, lifesaving, water confidence, safety, survival, rescue skills and basic life support;
- b) Courses are provided nationwide to the general public and also to children as part of the primary school curriculum in classrooms, pools and open water nationwide;
- Many qualifications such as our Pool and Beach Lifeguarding Awards are recognised internationally;
- d) Beach Lifeguards are trained and tested by our examiners for the Local Authorities prior to the annual summer season each year;
- e) Trained Lifesavers compete in provincial and national Lifesaving Championships and at International level;
- f) Risk Assessments on bathing areas and waterways nationwide that may pose a particular risk to the public, in order to make them safer;
- g) Train and examine rescue boat crews for the Community Inshore Rescue Services and administer associated VAT refunds;
- h) Water safety training for those working near aquatic environments in the public and private sector:

Promotion

- Research, analysis and publication of drowning statistics that inform policy and enable effective targeting of those at risk of drowning;
- b) National and local media to build a public awareness of coastal and inland watersafety;
- Publications, courses, advice and campaigns in print and online that promote watersafety and target at-risk groups in all aquatic activities so that the public adheres to best practices;
- d) Supporting the work of over 7,000 members and those volunteering and commercially delivering swimming, lifesaving and basic life support training;
- e) A National Water Safety Awards Ceremony that includes the

"Seiko Just-In-Time" Rescue Awards and other awards that recognise volunteerism and partnerships that promote water safety at national and local level.

National Water Safety Awareness Week (June 12th - June 18th)

National Water Safety Awareness Week took place from June 12th – June 18th 2023. To mark the week, Water Safety Ireland hosted a "Throw A Ringbuoy" demonstration for primary school students in Galway. This interactive and engaging session led by the Education team in Water Safety Ireland guided students through the process of effectively throwing a ringbuoy, while learning the importance of personal safety around waterways. Water Safety Area Committees hosted "Throw A Ringbuoy" events for school children in their area and delivered key advice in advance of the summer season. A national marketing campaign was run in media outlets nationwide throughout the week, which raised awareness of prominent water safety issues for the public.





Twenty nine lives were saved from drowning through the brave actions of rescuers who received recognition at Water Safety Ireland's National Awards Ceremony on Tuesday, 14th November 2023. The Award Ceremony was the first in-person event since 2019, following the Covid-19 pandemic. WSI is grateful to Timemark for sponsoring the Seiko watches. Details of each rescue are listed in this report. 

Water Safety Ireland issued 138 WISE (Water, Insight, Safety & Education) certificates in 2023 to Transition Year secondary school students. The programme builds on the lessons learned in the PAWS (Primary Aquatic Water Safety) programme and equips students with the knowledge they need to make the right decisions in all sorts of situations to keep themselves, and others, safe on, or near, water.



WISE involves a series of eight lessons that provide a solid introduction to Water Safety, with a focus on risk assessment and water safety strategies for all aspects of our daily lives, from specific water-based activities to hazards and the potential of unforeseen accidents.

The lessons look at different environments and highlight potential dangers so students can better assess the risks, and their ability, to determine the safest course of action in all types of situations for themselves and others.

A total of 48,500 Seal and Marlin swimming competency certificates were issued, giving total certification issued by Water Safety Ireland of 113,272.

WSI Water Safety Area Committees nationwide run an extensive series of swimming and water safety weeks throughout the summer in pools, rivers, lakes and beachfronts. Many of these classes extend beyond the summer in places that have pools and leisure centres. Swim weeks consist of instruction in swimming and water safety weeks develop skills in rescue, water survival and basic life support.



Twenty-nine lives were saved from drowning by rescuers who received recognition at Water Safety Ireland's National Annual Awards Ceremony at the Printworks Event and Exhibition Centre, Dublin Castle on Tuesday 14th 2023, 3pm – 6pm.

The Minister for Rural and Community Development Heather Humphreys TD acknowledged recipients of a range of Awards including the SEIKO Just in Time Awards, Long Service Awards, and Recognition Awards for services rendered to Water Safety Ireland and also the Volunteer of the Year Award. Dara McGee, Cormac Coyne, Emma O'Grady – Áras Éanna, Inish Oirr & Ellen Glynn

If you ever wonder, That you might be, Past the point of rescue, The answer my friend, Is always "NO"...

This is the opening line of a poem by Emma O'Grady, living on the island of Inis Oírr, the smallest of the three Aran Islands. Emma evokes her personal reflection on the harrowing ordeal of two Galway cousins, Ellen Glynn (pictured) and Sara Feeney who went missing overnight after they went paddleboarding on Galway Bay.

After a harrowing night, they were spotted by a father and son brought safely onto the island. They had seized hold of buoys that were marking crab pots set by a fisherman off Inis Oírr. Those buoys that they held onto are similar to those recovered on a coastline cleanup and used this summer by the island's Arts Centre "Áras Éanna" for an artist's exhibition to mark World Drowning Prevention Day. Thanks to Dara McGee at Áras Éanna for arranging the exhibition, to Cormac Coyne for creating the video, to Emma O'Grady for her lovely poem and to Ellen Glynn for helping us to raise awareness for World Drowning Prevention Day. A good news story in which the arts prompted people to make water safety part of their conversations.



Leon Quinlan Perpetual Award



She attends every open day that she possibly can, and normally takes on the mantle of Volunteer Organiser for these events within the Dublin area. For example, she played a pivotal, leading role in the promotion of water safety at Dublin Fire Brigade Station Open Days, Dublin South County Council - Active Volunteer Groups Day and the Annual National Services Day Parade.

Bernie is also a Water Safety Instructor and Examiner, a Pool, Beach and Inland Open Water Lifeguard Tutor, a Swim Teacher and Tutor, a Water Safety Awareness Course Tutor, the Senior Designated Liaison Person for Dublin and a PAWS (Primary Aquatics Water Safety) Provider. As if this isn't enough, Bernie is also currently training to be a Risk Assessor certified by International Life Saving Europe (ILSE).

Other roles she has held in the past include Sports Referee, Sports Team Coach and Pool Deck Manager. Bernie is an integral part of the annual Skerries Water Safety Week where she, along with the local Admin Team, manage the Swimming Classes on the Beach, numbering on average 400 in a week.

She continues to offer her help on nationally run courses and has been part of the Tutor Team for National Pool Lifeguard Tutor courses and National Trainee Examiner Courses over many years. While her support and help are recognised on these courses, the personalised presentation she gives on disability awareness, in one of her expertise areas, is second to none.

Winnie Foran, Waterford - awarded Life Governorship by Council on October 27, 2023

Winnie has given more than fifty years' service to Water Safety Ireland. Her commitment started as a young teacher in her early thirties in Ballyduff National School, Waterford where she taught water safety to her pupils who lived in close proximity to the sea near Boatstrand. Winnie began her water safety journey in the 1970s and qualified through the various grades, eventually becoming a WSI Examiner. She taught swimming and lifesaving during winter and summer programmes and remains that chief organiser for the Boatstrand water safety weeks where thousands of children have learnt swimming and lifesaving over the years. Winnie continues to serve on the Waterford Water Safety Area Committee.

Jim Cushen, Dublin - awarded Life Governorship by Council on October 25, 2023

Jim has been a member of Water Safety Ireland since 1970. He has taught lifesaving and Basic Life Support CPR to thousands of children and adults since 1973 when he became a Trainee instructor. Two years later, Jim qualified as an Instructor in 1975. He qualified as a Swimming Instructor in 1982, joined the Dublin Water Safety Area Committee in 1983 and was appointed an Examiner in 1983. Over the years, Jim has lectured to many groups on Water Safety matters and run Basic Life Support classes to many local groups including golf clubs in the Dublin and Kildare region. He has consistently supported WSI promotional activities, exhibitions, conferences, AGMs, Examiners conferences, and Continuous Professional Development events over the years. Jim remains an outstanding member of WSI at committee and community level and is well known for promoting water safety in his local community, and for training many committee members.



Ronnie Horan - awarded Life Governorship by Council on October 25, 2023

Ronnie has dedicated over 40 years of continuous voluntary service to WSI. Ronnie began his journey in lifesaving as a trainee instructor in 1977 and quickly followed this accolade when he became a full instructor in 1979 and an Examiner in 1984. Ronnie continued his WSI training by qualifying as a tutor, a risk assessor and a lifeguard provider. Over the last four decades Ronnie has been involved in a wide range of drowning prevention roles. Ronnie has been a voluntary crew member of his local RNLI, and CRBI for more than 20 years. He became a member of the Dublin WSAC in the 1980's and taught summer weeks throughout the eighties. Ronnie has been a committee member, Council member, Commission Chairman, Commission member and an ILSE sub-committee member. Ronnie is also a Senior Risk assessment tutor with ILSE and is a member of ILSE Disaster Flood Operations Committee. Ronnie has committed his time and energy in the promotion of safety in and around all aspects of water and he continues to deliver with passion and dedication on behalf of WSI.

The SEIKO "Just In Time" Award & Rescue Appreciation Award



Kindly sponsored by SEIKO, these awards recognise courageous rescue interventions to assist persons in immediate danger in the water. Congratulations to all 55 rescuers for helping to save 29 lives in the following 24 incidents.

Presented to those who came to the assistance of person(s) in difficulty in water and in danger of drowning. Without their quick thinking, the outcomes could have been very different.

Garda Recipients

1. Garda Conor O'Keefe (JIT), Co. Wicklow (rescued: 1)

In July this year, Gardaí responded to a call for emergency help to the Promenade, Bray. Upon arrival, they were alerted to a woman in distress in the water. Garda O Keefe retrieved a lifebuoy and entered the water. He managed to swim out to the woman and utilising his Water Safety Ireland beach lifeguard training he put the woman in a cross chest carry and brought her to safety. Thank you, Garda O'Keefe.



2. Garda Denis Costello (RA), Garda Niamh Fitzgerald (RA) and Garda Mark Power (RA), Co. Wexford (rescued: 1)

In September just past, Garda Power received a call from Garda Costello regarding a woman attempting to enter the water at Wexford bridge. Gardaí Costello and Fitzgerald managed to lift the woman over the railing to safety. Thank you all.



3. Sergeant Alan Commons (RA), Garda Tom Currid (RA) and Garda Paul Mannion (RA), Co. Leitrim (rescued: 1)

In June of this year, at Carrick-on Shannon, Gardaí were alerted to a man in distress in the water. Upon arriving to the area, Sergeant Commons decided to enter the reed bank, and all three Gardaí waded in where visibility was very poor. After some searching Sergeant Commons observed bubbles rising and noticed a faint outline of human body beneath the surface of the water. All three Gardaí managed to lift the person out of the water to safety. Thank you all.



4. Garda Brendan Byrne (RA), Garda Adrian O'Reilly (RA), Garda Stephen Murray (RA) and Garda Finbarr Thompson (RA), Co. Dublin (rescued: 1)

This September at O'Connell Street bridge, Gardaí were on patrol when they became aware of a female in distress in the water, clinging to the side of the bridge. Garda Murray & Thompson retrieved ring buoys and Gardaí Byrne & O'Reilly proceeded to the water. Garda O'Reilly held onto Garda Byrne as he entered the water. Garda Byrne threw the ring buoy towards the lady however a second successful attempt was required as the lady lost her initial first grip. The lady was brought to safety and made a full recovery. Thank you all.





5. Garda Mark Cullen (JIT), Co. Dublin (rescued: 1)

Last July, at the Royal canal in Phibsborough, a man suffered a seizure and subsequently fell into the water. Off duty Garda Mark Cullen was at the scene, he entered the water and reached out for the man who had gone underwater. Mark pulled him onto the bank to safety and realised the man was not out of his seizure state. Mark placed him into the recovery position, and after some time he recovered. Mark waited with him until emergency services arrived. He made a full recovery. Thank you, Mark



6. Garda Eoin O'Connor (JIT), Co. Dublin (rescued: 1)

Last September at Ushers Quay Garda O'Connor was off duty and driving home when he observed a gathering of people at the wall of the river Liffey. After stopping, he went over to discover a male was in difficulty in the water. Garda O Connor entered the water and assisted the male. He managed to reach him and hold onto him until Dublin Fire Brigade rescue boat assisted them both. The male was taken to safety. He made a full recovery. Thank you, Garda O'Connor



7. Garda Ian Kelly (JIT) & Garda Bryan Roche (RA), Co. Dublin (rescued: 1)

Earlier this year in April Gardaí Kelly & Roche, while on patrol became alerted to a female unconscious in Burgh Quay. Garda Roche immediately radioed for assistance and Garda Kelly threw a lifebuoy, however the lady was too distressed to grab on and he entered the river. He managed to carry the lady, assisted by the lifebuoy to the canal ladder and waited for the fire brigade unit to arrive. The female was taken to hospital where she made a full recovery. Thank you Garda Kelly & Roche.



8. Garda Emmet Cassidy (RA), Garda Noel Gavighan (RA) and Sergeant Mark Colgan (RA), Co. Donegal (rescued: 1)

In March of this year, Gardaí Cassidy, Gavighan & Colgan received a call regarding a male in difficulty in the water in Glenties. On arrival, they located a male lying on the riverbank on the other side of the river. Gardaí Cassidy & Gavighan tied crime scene tape onto Sergeant Colgan. He entered the water and waded across the river. The male was conscious and indicated that he was cold and injured. Sergeant Colgan placed the male onto his shoulder and brought him across the water to safety. They subsequently took him to the garda station for care until the paramedics arrived. He made a full recovery. Thank you all.



9. Garda Kevin Fitzpatrick (JIT) & Sergeant John O'Sullivan (JIT), Co. Kilkenny (rescued: 1)

Last November, Garda Fitzpatrick & Sergeant O'Sullivan were notified of a male and female in distress in the River Barrow. Sergeant O'Sullivan, who is a strong swimmer entered the water in a bid to reach the male. Garda Fitzpatrick retrieved a lifebuoy and swam over to both the male and Sergeant O'Sullivan. Both Gardaí pulled the male onto the bank to safety. The female had managed to make her way safety onto the riverbank on the opposite side of the river. The male and female were both taken to hospital and treated appropriately. Both made a full recovery. Thank you Garda Fitzpatrick and Sergeant O'Sullivan.



10. Garda Lynam (JIT) and Garda Duhova (RA), Co. Dublin (rescued: 1)

Last August, at the River Liffey, Garda Lynam became alerted to a male in distress in the water. She went to the scene and observed the male face down in the water. She entered the water and swam towards the male. She turned him onto his back and swam towards the edge. Garda Duhova and passers-by threw a rope to Garda Lynam. They managed to remove the male from the water and bring him to safety. The male was taken to hospital and made a full recovery. Thank you Garda Lynam and Garda Duhova.

11. Garda Claire Davis (RA) & Garda Nora Cloherty (RA), Co. Westmeath and Kieran Milnar (RA) and Pat McArdle (RA) from Mullingar Sailing Club (rescued: 1)

In June of 2021, at Lough Owel, Mullingar, Gardaí Davis, and Cloherty were alerted to a male that had entered the water. They contacted a member of the local sailing club and requested their urgent assistance. They then accompanied two members of the club and launched a Rib. On locating the person in the water, both Gardaí managed to drag him out of the water. The quick action of all involved led to the safe removal of this male from the water. The man was taken to hospital where he made a full recovery. Thank you, all.



12. Sergeant Cathal McGeoghan (RA), Co. Waterford (rescued: 1)

In June of this year Sergeant McGeoghan was returning home off duty, when he noticed a female in distress in the water at Grattan Quay. He immediately called for assistance, retrieved a ring buoy, and threw it to the woman while giving her instructions to grab onto it. He was able to able use the rope to drag the woman to safety. He reassured her and stayed with her until the Waterford Fire Brigade boat arrived and took over. The woman was taken to hospital, where she made a full recovery. Thank you, Sergeant McGeoghan.



13. Garda Keith Keating (RA), Co. Wicklow (rescued: 1)

In July of this year, at Bray Harbour, Garda Keating became alerted to a woman in distress in the water. He utilised a dingy boat in the harbour and upon reaching the woman, managed to pull her from the water and took her to safety. The woman received medical attention and made a full recovery. Thank you, Garda Keating.



14. Garda Gary McDonald (JIT), Garda Kieth Keating (JIT), and Garda reserve Ivan Keogh (RA), Co. Wicklow (rescued: 1)

Again, in July of this year Gardaí received a call regarding a man in distress in the water at the Cove, Greystones. Upon arriving to the area, Garda Reserve Keogh retrieved a lifebuoy and a blanket and Gardaí Keating and McDonald waded out towards the male, they placed him into an arm carry and brought to safety onto the shore. They took him to the garda station, where he received medical treatment. The man made a full recovery. Thank you all.



15. Garda Ciara Hayes (RA) and Garda David Power (RA), Co. Wicklow (rescued: 1)

In August this year at Strand Road, Bray, Gardaí Hayes & Power were alerted to a female in distress in the water. After an extensive search of the area, they spotted a body floating in the water. Both Gardaí waded into the water and managed to bring the person to safety. She made a full recovery. Thank you, Garda Hayes and Garda Power.



Public Recipients

16. Antonia Williams (JIT), Co. Antrim (rescued: 1)

In July this year, while in Madeira, Antonia observed a young male in difficulty in the water. She sprinted towards the sea, while instructing others to call for help and an ambulance. She saw two males trying to keep the young man's head above water and could see he was beginning to lose consciousness. As soon as she reached them, she turned the young male onto his back, cupped his chin and pulled him towards the beach. She successfully performed CPR with the help of another person. The emergency services arrived, and he made a full recovery. Thank you, Antonia.

17. Cillian Ginty (JIT) and Damien Ginty (RA), Co. Kerry (rescued: 1)

This September, at Banna Beach, Cillian noticed a surfing kite drifting out to sea and the kite surfer appeared missing. He then observed a woman entering the water with a ring buoy and it appeared she was not a strong swimmer. With the lend of a surfboard, Cillian and his father Damien paddled out. Damien advised the lady not to swim out any further and swam back to shore. As Cillian approached the kite, he noticed a man extremely fatigued, holding onto the remaining float. Cillian tied the surfboard leash to his ankle and assisted the surfer into shore by towing. Thank you, Cillian and Damien.



18. Michael Kavanagh (JIT), David Mulchay (JIT), Eamon O'Grady (JIT) and Antonio Deramo (RA), Co. Sligo (rescued: 3)

This June, at Strandhill beach slipway, Eamon, a non-swimmer, noticed three girls in difficulty in the water. Luckily Michael and David (off duty surf instructors) were close by when Eamon raised the alarm. They both responded by retrieving rescue boards and entered the water. Antonio, who was surfing in the area, also noticed the girls in difficulty. Each gentleman managed to take one of the girls onto their boards and made their way back to shore. All three girls were successfully rescued and made a full recovery. Thank you all.



19. Donncha Maguire (JIT) and Darragh Flanagan (JIT), Co. Donegal (rescued: 1)

In June of this year, Donncha and Darragh were on the rocks at Bundoran beach when they heard a cry for help. They immediately assessed the situation, entered the water and swam towards the scene where they noticed a person was unresponsive. Using the cross-chest technique they successfully brought the casualty to safety, where an off-duty nurse and fireman performed CPR while the emergency services arrived, he made a full recovery. Thank you Donncha and Darragh.

20. Rebecca Ebbs (JIT) and Zara Reid (JIT), Co. Donegal (rescued: 2)

In May of this year at the Shorefront, Buncrana, Rebecca and Zara became alerted to two females in distress in the water. Both Rebecca and Zara entered the water, which was very choppy, however they both managed to swim out to the females. On reaching the swimmers they turned them onto their backs, placed their arms under the swimmers' arms and brought both females to safety. Both females were taken to hospital and made a full recovery. Thank you, Rebecca and Zara.



21. Bernard Deegan (JIT), Philip Lavery (JIT), John Fitzmaurice (JIT) and Colin Fanning (JIT), Co. Waterford (rescued: 2)

In July this year at Guillamene, Tramore, Colin noticed some people in difficulty in the water and obtained a ring buoy; Bernard called the emergency services. The swells were very large, it was difficult to throw the ring buoy, so Colin entered the water with the ring buoy and swam towards the people in distress. Upon approaching the two people, Colin took the responsive person and brought her safely back to shore. Philip & John entered the water and took charge of the unresponsive man and John began CPR on the man in the water. Colin and Bernard then re-entered the water and they all helped John by keeping him afloat as he administered CPR. The RNLI boat came on the scene and took over. Thank you all.



22. Orla Cosgrave Kirwan (JIT), Co. Wexford (rescued: 1)

In September this year, at Cahore beach, Orla was alerted to a lady in distress in the water. She called out to the lady and then entered the water. Orla swam out and upon reaching her discovered she was unresponsive. Orla managed to take the lady to shore, began CPR, called out for an AED and ensured the ambulance was on its way. She was assisted by another person. The ambulance arrived and began advanced care. Thank you Orla.



23. Ailish Collins (JIT), Conor Healy (JIT), Joe Garry (JIT) and Jamie Malone (JIT), Co. Clare (rescued: 1)

Also, in June this year the staff and students of Cloughleigh school were returning from a sports day by the River Fergus walk, when they became alerted to a woman calling for help for her daughter. All four teachers, Ailish, Conor, Joe and Jamie entered the water and managed to keep the girl afloat, while another got a paddle board from the school store. They successfully brought the girl ashore; emergency services arrived and took the girl to hospital. She made a full recovery. Thank you all.



24. Michael Slabosz (JIT) and John O Rourke (JIT), Co. Kilkenny (rescued: 1)

In August of this year, at the River Nore, Bateman Quay, Michael and John became aware of a woman in distress in the water. They both entered the water, came to her aid and managed to bring her to safety. She made a full recovery. Thank you, Michael and John.

It's one of the smallest radio stations operating in Ireland but listenership doubles during the summer period when people take to a range of aquatic activities on Connemara's many waterways. They have enjoyed strong commitment by 85 volunteers for nearly 30 years and we wish them every success on this level of voluntary activity into the future.

Analysis of Drownings 2023

Water Safety Ireland - targeting at-risk groups with drowning prevention initiatives.

The total number of drownings in Ireland in 2023 was 78, 15 fewer than in 2022 when 93 drowned. The average number of drownings each year over the five years (2017-2021) is 118. Each figure in the following graphical analysis, be it accidental, suicide or of undetermined cause, reflects a preventable tragedy that affects so many lives. Water Safety Ireland continues to target at-risk groups with initiatives to highlight best practices so that drownings are reduced.

A synopsis of some general contributory factors over the years:

- 1. Poor or inadequate equipment (e.g. boats or lifejackets);
- 2. Not wearing a correctly fitting lifejacket;
- 3. Alcohol consumption;
- Falling unexpectedly into water;
- 5. Improper use of boats and equipment;
- 6. Overestimation of skills; underestimation of ability;
- 7. Lack of local knowledge when travelling in Ireland and abroad;
- 8. Not being able to swim or not having lifesaving and water survival skills;
- 9. Easy unauthorized access to waterways;
- 10. Cold water shock and hypothermia;
- 11. Current (including rip currents, river currents, and tidal currents);
- 12. Offshore winds (including flotation devices);
- 13. Pre-existing diseases;
- 14. Underwater entanglement;
- 15. Bottom surface gradient and stability;
- 16. Waves (coastal, boat);
- 17. Water transparency;
- 18. Impeded visibility (including coastal configuration, structures and overcrowding);
- 19. Lack of parental supervision (infants and children);
- 20. Change in weather conditions;
- 21. Excessive "horseplay" or over exuberant behaviour;
- 22. Swimming outside the depth of the user.

Analysis of Drownings 2023

A synopsis of some general preventive and management actions:

- 1. Public education by Water Safety Ireland regarding hazards and safe behaviours;
- 2. Teaching children to stay away from water when unsupervised through the WSI PAWS (Primary Aquatics Water Safety) programme;
- 3. Continual adult supervision of children;
- 4. WSI media campaigns that drowning can happen quickly and quietly;
- 5. Promote in WSI press announcements, the restriction of alcohol provision before or during aquatic activities;
- 6. The training and assessment of Lifeguards by WSI;
- 7. Teaching swimming and lifesaving skills from the WSI syllabus;
- 8. Water Safety Ireland Risk Assessments that include assessments of local hazard warning notices, access to emergency response and availability of resuscitation skills/facilities and other factors;
- Development by Water Safety Ireland of rescue and resuscitation skills among general public and user groups;
- 10. Coordination by Water Safety Ireland with user group associations concerning hazard awareness and safe behaviours:
- 11. Wearing of adequate lifejackets and Personal Flotation Devices when boating and angling from shore;
- 12. Fencing and doors to isolate outdoor aquatic environments.
- 13. Maintaining a safe distance from water's edge (S.A.F.E. Stay Away From Edges).





