




#### **RED Line Methodology**

- Research was conducted using RED C's online omnibus, the RED Line.
- Through an online panel of over 45,000 members, RED Line allows us to reach a representative sample of the adult population 18+ across Ireland in a cost effective and timely manner.
- Quota controls are used to ensure a nationally representative sample of ROI adults aged 18+, with interlocking quotas to provide extra confidence in sample profile.
- Data was weighted across gender, age, region and social class so as to ensure a nationally representative sample based on latest CSO projections.
- 1,004 respondents took part with fieldwork taking place from the 31<sup>st</sup> July to 5<sup>th</sup> August 2025

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#### **Cost of Living Impact Study**

Young people are generally seen by society to disproportionately bear the brunt of the rising cost of living and with the vast majority in consensus that the government needs to do more. The result of this is that 3 in 5 under 25s are considering emigrating to enjoy a better quality of life elsewhere with over 3 in 10 currently *strongly* considering such a move.

Most young people are being negatively affected by the rising cost of living with over 4 in 5 18-24 year olds describing themselves as negatively affected. The single greatest financial challenge facing young people is rent/accommodation, but other challenges also present themselves including educational fees, groceries and social/leisure activities.

There is clear greater scope for the government to alleviate these issues with 4 in 5 disagreeing that the government is doing enough to support young people through cost of living, and with only 13% thinking they are doing enough.

Additionally there is widespread consensus that housing (64%) and cost of living (70%) disproportionately affect young people. This combined with 7 in 10 disagreeing that life in Ireland is any easier than years ago, suggests the extent to which financial issues are affecting young people today.

The result of this is that two thirds of young people say they would enjoy a better quality of life elsewhere with 3 in 5 under 25s considering emigrating abroad due to the quality of life, with 3 in 10 of them *strongly* considering such a move.


# Consumer Mood somewhat improved on April, but remains extremely negative

Consumer confidence has improved marginally since April, but nonetheless remains extremely negative on the whole with far more believing the economy will fare worse than better in the coming months

Consumer Mood Monitor by key demographics: expectations for the Irish economy six months from now







#### Most youth negatively affected

Over 4 in 5 18-24 year olds say both they themselves and 18-24 year olds in general are negatively impacted by the cost of living

84% of 18-24 year olds say they themselves are negatively impacted by the cost of living




#### 9 in 10 believe adults in general are negatively impacted

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The majority believe all listed groups are negatively impacted by the cost of living, but agreement is highest for adults in general followed by young peopled aged 18-24, and lowest for young people under 18.

#### Lower social grades less likely to say younger negatively impacted



Under 35s are more likely than older age cohorts to say young people are negatively impacted by the cost of living



Rent/accommodation is the single most common challenge even among full-time students at 94% with educational fees at 57%



#### Parents are more likely to say their quality of life has worsened

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Older age cohorts are less likely to say their quality of life has worsened, while 25-54 year olds are the most likely to say this







#### Housing and cost of living seen to particularly impact youth






#### Views on cost of living crisis I










#### Government not seen to do enough

Q8. To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statements that others have made in relation to the cost of living?




#### 3 in 5 young people are considering emigrating



Half of Irish adults believe their quality of life would be better elsewhere, rising to two thirds of under 25s, while 3 in 10 are considering moving abroad, rising to 3 in 5 among under 25s

**31%** of 18-24 year olds are *strongly* considering moving abroad due to the quality of life

#### Over 3 in 5 U35s say their quality of life would be better abroad

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Almost two thirds of 18-34 year olds say their quality of life would be better outside of Ireland. This is also high among parents at almost 3 in 5.




#### All listed experiences have worsened in the past six months

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More say their experience has worsened than say it has improved in the past six months across all listed areas with the worst being overall quality of life; ability to pay bills; and mental health

#### Great majority say housing disproportionately affects youth



7 in 10 agree young people are disproportionately affected by the rising cost of living. Half believe their quality of life would be higher outside of Ireland rising to two thirds of 18-24 year olds.
